28th Annual Port State Control Course 24 - 29 April 2016, Holiday Inn Hotel, Southampton

This comprehensive 28th annual international short course, provides detailed authoritative coverage of latest regulatory developments affecting port state control, as well as the changing international port state practices.

The course includes port and vessel visits and covers the IMO conventions and codes associated with all ship types including; bulk, tanker, LNG, cruise and coastal ferry inspection. A separate section focuses on fishing vessel safety and PSC inspections. Environmental areas include MARPOL annex amendments, special area and EAS. New policy developments for managers and inspectors for 2016 include PSC auditing and accident investigation.

The course is fully residential and designed for officials in national marine departments, port and terminal operators, ship owners, ship managers, ship operators and senior sea going officers.

About the International Maritime Bureau

The ICC International Maritime Bureau (IMB) is a specialised division of the International Chamber Of Commerce (ICC). It was established in 1981 to act as a focal point in the fight against all types of maritime fraud, malpractice and piracy.

The United Nations (UN) International Maritime Organization (IMO) in its resolution A 504 (XII) (9) adopted on 20 November 1981, has among other things urged all governments, interests and organizations to exchange information and provide appropriate co-operation with the IMB with a view to maintaining and developing a co-ordinated action in combating maritime fraud. The IMB has a MoU with the World Customs Organisation (WCO) and an observer status with the International Criminal Police Organization (ICPO – INTERPOL).

The IMB is a non-profit making division of the ICC and works closely with international organisations on matters connected with its specialist role in the industry, which is to protect the integrity of international trade by seeking out fraud and malpractice. The IMB is universally accepted as the industry 'watchdog' for all types of crime and related negligence affecting the international trading community.

IMB Port State Control Course

The IMB Port State Control course presents the latest developments and amendments to the major conventions, Regulations and codes, including SOLAS, IMSBC MARPOL 73/78 and annexes, IMSBC, HSC, BCH, IBC and IMDG codes.

In addition the course also looks at the IMO codes for bulk carriers and timber deck cargoes, fishing vessel safety protocols, new regulations for port state control and revised port state IMO procedures.



Course Directors: Mr. Michael Howlett, Assistant Director, ICC International Maritime Bureau and Professor R P Barston.

Professor Barston is a specialist in maritime safety; international maritime and other conventions; and port state inspection. He has served in the Maritime, Aviation and Environment Department of the UK Foreign and Commonwealth Office and has been involved in Law of the Sea negotiations. In the UK he has taught at several universities including London School of Economics (Director of The Maritime Policy Programme), Lancaster, Cardiff and in the United States. He has also taught in Trieste (IMO), on Flag and Port State Control and is an IMO consultant.

The faculty consists of senior speakers and leading experts drawn from international organisations and maritime agencies from the UK and other European communities including IMB, InMarsat, Lloyds Register, SIGTTO, USCG Activities Europe and UK MCGA.

COURSE AIMS & BENEFITS

This leading short course for maritime professionals covers the latest international regulatory changes and implications for the conduct of port state control.

It looks at problems faced by those involved in ship inspections and how they can best be managed.

The course also looks at comparative port state control - what to expect globally.

The course covers in depth, amendments to the main international safety codes and conventions relating to oil, chemical and bulk carriers and other specialist vessels (LNG, LPG).

The course is run in an informal seminar/presentation style, with an emphasis on encouraging discussion, questions and exchange.

The course relates international regulation to inspection practice and maritime policy.



WHY ATTEND THE COURSE ?

The content and scope of Port State Control is under constant development. It is important for ship owners, operators and maritime administrators to remain abreast of these changes.

Added to the 2016 course is coverage of developments in fisheries, to reflect the recent intensive work of the IMO and FAO (Port State measures Agreement) in regulations for fishing vessel safety and inspection.

The course includes new maritime policy areas, including the IMO Implementation Code; the conduct of port state audits, work on international standardization carried out by IMO and a review of international procedures for Accident Investigation (Code).

Special sections look at MARPOL annexes and passenger vessel (coastal and large cruise) safety inspection.



WHO SHOULD ATTEND ?

The course will benefit al those directly related to a Port State inspection including but not being limited to Port State Officers, Port Facility Security Officers, Personal from the Ministry of Maritime Administrations, Port and Harbour managers, P&I clubs, flag and class surveyors and representatives of regional MOUs.

The course will also be beneficial to Shipowners, operators, CSOs, DPAs, Marine Superintendents and Masters.
